Anna Bebermeyer: A true Pioneer Woman

Our community was
populated with strong
pioneer women from the
beginning. For a series of
articles for this newsletter,
I will tell some of those
women's stories.

Anna Fulton was born March 9, 1886. Her parents, William D. Fulton and Martha Jane Laney were married in Illinois in 1871 and moved to Kansas in 1876, homesteading 9 miles N.W. of Abilene in Flora and Willowdale townships.

W.D. was a pioneer and assisted in the platting of Talmage in 1887. He

drove the first nail in the first building built in Talmage, had one of the first stores, and helped establish the first three elevators in town. He was the first Vice-President of the bank, a leader in establishing the

telephone system and bringing electricity to town, and involved in building up the school and church in the community.



following his father's footsteps, owned and operated a furniture store and funeral parlor on Main Street. He married Pearl Higdon and died at age 52 in 1937. William Harrison (Harry) Fulton was born in 1888, married Elizabeth (Lizzie) Bauman in 1912 and farmed in Willowdale Township until after his retirement when he was janitor at the Talmage School. Harry and Lizzie were killed in a tragic traffic accident near Marion, Kansas in 1968.

With her father as an example, Anna grew up watching the progress of the community, learning about the shared responsibility and hard work that went into the building of our community. The church was an important part of the community, and Anna was very active in the Talmage Methodist Episcopal Church. She was a Sunday School teacher in the primary department, and was Sunday School superintendent for many years. A great deal of her life was spent in public service. When she was 20 years old in 1906, she was cashier of the Talmage State Bank, working for J. B. Higdon, president Anna moved to Abilene and for a of the bank.

on 15 Nov 1922; their engagement announcement stated: "For months past the Talmage community has watched with growing interest the pleasant and decorous courtship of Samuel W. Bebermeyer and Miss Anna J. Fulton, two well-known young people of the community and Dickinson County, who have been active in church and social circles for miles around. The bride was

born and raised in the community and has been among the leaders of the church and social circles since her early youth. In these activities as well as in her official duties in the bank, her pleasing manners and unfailing courtesy has made friends on every side and the best wishes for 'Anna' is to be heard from every one."

Along with Sam, Anna took an active part in the Talmage Tractor & Implement Co. and that building is still on the West side of Main St. They lived in the J.B. Higdon home, after he left the bank in 1924, moving to Topeka; the house was eventually the Dwight and Alice Garver home.

After Sam's death in 1945, number of years was employed in Anna married Sam Bebermeyer the Treasurer's office at the

courthouse. Helen Fulton remembers "Aunt Anna" being a visible, outgoing leader of the community, devoted to nieces and nephews, her church and her community.

I think Anna was a working woman that blazed a trail for herself and others, following in her parents footsteps. It can be said that Anna had a hand in shaping our parents lives, and consequently, our own. We can be proud and grateful there are women like her in our history. 
Library plans in the works....
