On April I, we were selected by the foundation for the entire amount. Covid -19 hit, and we had problems finding anyone with four goals in their inventory. We finally purchased the goals at Academy Sports.

On June 4th the goals arrived and with the help of Mid Kansas Cooperative fork lift, we took them to Jim Collin's welding shop. With Jim's help, the goals were assembled and ready to be installed, but first the old goals had to be taken down.

When the old goals were installed, two of the goals were welded in place and one of the goals had to be completely burned off with a welder.

With the help of Russ Irvine and his tractor, Jim Collins, Larry Coup, Josiah Gilley, and Randall Bathurst, the goals were finally installed. The youth of our community were soon shooting baskets. The Talmage Community can now be proud of their park and basketball courts.

Huitt land recognized as a Century Farm

While the Huitt Farm has attained centennial status, it was actually owned by the family prior to Miles Huitt. David and Maryett Matteson bought two parcels, the first in 1877 from Ambrose Langstone and the second in 1879 from H.B. Hill to create the 160 acre farm.

The Mattesons sold the farm in 1883 to Adam Saylor, and David Matteson went on to become the mayor of Abilene in 1890 for three terms.

Miles married Myrtle Maryett Laney August 29,1906. Myrtle was the granddaughter of David and Maryett Matteson. Miles and Myrtle Huitt bought the 160 acre farm June 11, 1919 from Adam Saylor for \$202.50 per acre.

Adam Saylor built the farmhouse that Miles, Myrtle, and their son Dena lived in. The farmhouse and barn still stand today, but were sold in 1986. Miles' second wife

Jewel lived on the farm until she moved into Abilene in 1986.

Paula Huitt Manley is the current owner of the farm and she remembers visiting the farm through the years. Her favorite farm memories include spending time on the farm in summer, riding the tractor during harvest time, and helping her grandparents on the farm.

She used to carry lunch out to her Grandfather Miles when he was working on the farm. They also used to lay out a big spread at lunchtime for the team who came to help with the harvest.

Paula remembers the man from the creamery picking up the milk, and the egg man picking up the eggs. She also




enjoyed playing with Linda Chase and roaming around on the farm.



To further complicate our situation, many of the

donations we normally receive were devoted to the Annual Community Foundation of Dickinson County Donation Day. Growing our library endowment fund is essential and important to our goal of covering all basic expenses without depending on donations in the near future, but because our effort in that area came shortly before we were shut down due to the pandemic, we are short of funds.

We maintain and operate a large building on approximately \$500 per month, which includes electric, propane, water, and internet. We are conservative stewards of our resources and are much more than a library, offering a place for leisure activities for the young and the young at heart. To put it succinctly, we are important to the community and your generosity is greatly appreciated.
