Life in the 1950s and 60s... My days as a Topeka Capital newspaper boy

In the summer of 1956, Paul Funston, who would soon be entering high school, approached me about taking over his Topeka Capital newspaper route. His supervisor, Wm. "Bill" Flood, came and convinced me to take the job.

I was to be at the Talmage Post Office at 6:30 a.m. six days a week to pick up the papers. The Postmaster at that time was Clare Knerr.

On Sunday the newspapers were delivered to our home. As I left the post office, I walked a block west to Ross and Flora Harden's place (Larry & Sadie Irvine live there now).

I then retraced my footsteps back to Main Street place). and a half block further east to the John & Lou Book house (the house was burnt, then torn down and is station where Clara Graves and her husband lived no longer there).

The Walter & Marie Keckler's house was next on the route, a half block south (Sharon's Cramer's).

I then went down the alley, south, to Ralph & Leta Funston's place (the Bank's house).

From there I went to Clare & Anna Knerr's, just southwest from the church (the Fischers live there now).

Next was Anna & Elsie Jones home at the far southeast part of town (Feeney's home now), then a block west to Kim & Zella Marston's (the Saylor
