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
The Director of the Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum Dawn Hammatt toured the Talmage Museum on Wednesday, February 21.

After the tour, she talked about preserving artifacts and different ways to obtain information, especially about obtaining information on WWII veterans.

School Days at Talmage Grade School

Note: I have had many fond memories of students older and younger than myself, but for time sake, I will limit my writings only to my grade school class. I attended TGS for six weeks of kindergarten (just the second year for kindergarten) in the fall of 1963, graduating eighth grade in spring of 1972. We were the last class to graduate from Talmage Grade School...very special.

Before the fall of 1963, the only children I knew my age, were my cousins and the kids who attended Talmage United Methodist Church, I was only five at the time, so my life experiences were few and far between. The students I knew

at age five were my cousin Howard Engle and my Sunday School and Vacation Bible School classmates Glen Snider, Tammy Howard, Mike Alexander, Keith Schwab, Ricky Lake, Murl Garver, Carolyn Houston and C.J. Atkinson. At the time, Glen, Murl and I were the country kids. Everyone else were "city" kids, living in the Talmage metropolis.

Kindergarten was a new, up and coming concept for education, or at least for the rural schools. Talmage Grade School Board of Education implemented it for the fall of 1962. It lasted for six weeks, and they hired Wilma Luthi to teach these five-year-olds or five-year-olds to be. Back then, if a student was going to turn five sometime in that year, not the school year, in my case 1963, a student students to be delivered to TGS. We would be was eligible to attend school, so we had a few classmates who were almost a year older than another classmate. For example, my birthday was January 1958 and Ricky Lake's birthday was September 1958. Danny Wuthnow (who would transfer later to Talmage from Manchester) was born in December 1958, and Glen Snider was born in December 1957, so we had quite an age span in

Kindergarten was the first time I met many of my classmates. We had a large class of over 20 students. (Apparently 1958 was a good year for



having babies.) Wilma Luthi was our teacher and every student enjoyed Mrs. Luthi, who had a kind demeanor and a soft voice. She was made to be a Kindergarten teacher. We really didn't do anything too special. We did the basics, making sure we knew our numbers, colors, how to stand in line, listen to instructions and just be able to get along with others. All of the students brought a rug or mat from home to lay on for a short nap. For some reason, they thought kindergarten children needed some down time. I think it was more for Mrs. Luthi.

We only had kindergarten in the mornings. The country kindergarteners would ride on the regular bus (a personal car with a bus sign on it) with older dismissed to go home before lunch. The town students would walk home. The rural students would be picked up by our parents, usually our moms. Sometimes our mothers would pool rides and take turns taking children home.

At the end of six weeks, the school would celebrate by allowing the Kindergarten class to eat lunch at school. This was very special. You really felt like one of the big kids.


1925 Model T Ford Pickup

For a period of time, the Banks family had a creamery and sold gas at the building. I remember a basement

under the back part where vehicles could be stored. Harrison gave the property to the Talmage Community for use as a park.
