Colonel Everett Stewart: A true hero



This is a story about a young man who became a WWII hero: Colonel Everett W. Stewart, who was born July 18, 1915 on a farm just north of Talmage. He attended Talmage Grade School and graduated from Talmage High School in 1933. He then attended Kansas State College and was commissioned Second LT Infantry Reserve on May 30, 1938.

Soon after Colonel Stewart enlisted in the Army Air Corps and completed flying training at Kelly Field in Texas. His first duty was in Louisana, then he was sent to California and from there to Hawaii.

On December 7, 1941 the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor as well as the air field where Colonel Stewart was stationed. In his account of

that day, he stated that he could see his plane from his apartment window and it was on fire.

He was then assigned to the European Theater and was stationed in England. His job was to protect the allied bombers as they made their way across France and Germany. Having engaged the German fighter pilots many times he was credited with 10 1/2 victories and had approximately 3500 hours of flying time. He was awarded many medals as well as the title of "Ace". He always said he was from the same area as his Commander in Chief General Dwight D Eisenhower; a place just northwest of Abilene called Talmage.




Circa 1920's to 1950's... Watt, Phillips recreate Talmage Main Street

At the Talmage Museum, Roger Watt and Ronnie Phillips have recreated nineteen businesses from 1920's and 1930's Talmage Main Street, as well as six other iconic buildings we all remember through the 1950's.

Main Street took 495 hours to reproduce, with the Methodist Episcopal Church alone adding 165 more hours to the project.




The scale of the buildings is 1/24, one inch for every two feet of building.

Penner and Rowe share special Kansas destinations

The Kansas Sampler Foundation's Marci Penner and WenDee Rowe, authors of *The Kansas Guidebook 2 for Explorers,* presented "Exploring the Nooks and Crannies of Kansas" picture tour of Kansas to a large appreciative crowd at the Talmage Public Library and Event Center on Oct. 20.
