Our call for help is being answered in a generous fashion. C.T. and Susie Herman recently made a \$10,000 donation for the purchase and installation of energy efficient windows to replace the rotted and broken old ones in the school building.


To complete a transformation of the kitchen after Brian Lady and son Josh installed new windows, Brian and Lisa Gaskill Peters painted. By the time you read this newsletter, new flooring will also replace the old and torn linoleum.

The kitchen and dining areas are two of the most used rooms in the facility as we host large family gatherings and other events where meals are prepared and shared.

Thanks to the Hermans' generous donation, the rest of the windows will be replaced this summer. We look forward to hosting the Talmage All-School Reunion in September when former students, family, and friends can enjoy the fresh, clean look, along with the old familiar rooms and memories.

Some of the more expensive items, such as replacing older heating and air systems with new energy efficient models are in need of funds, while repairing the gymnasium floor will be a top priority for grant funds. First steps are being taken for a grant via a survey which will be sent to patrons living in the four townships which encompass the Talmage community: Willowdale, Buckeye, Flora, and Cheever.

The library board replaced the leaky hot water heater and now the kitchen and bathroom have on demand hot water. We are incurring expenses to provide for the future of the community. # Fulton family arrives in 1876

W.D. Fulton was age 6 when his family moved to the United States from Edinburg, Scotland. He and his wife Martha then moved to Dickinson County from Illinois in 1876, homesteading in Flora and Willowdale townships.

W.D. was a founding member of Talmage who assisted in the platting and drove the first nail in the first building. He operated one of the first stores in town and was instrumental in the beginnings of all three elevators. He also served on the board of Prairiedale Cemetery.

W.D. and Martha had six children and three lived to adulthood. Thomas married Pearl Higdon but they had no children; William Harrison (Harry) married Elisabeth (Lizzie) Bauman; and Anna Jane married Samuel Bebermeyer but they had no children.

W.D. and Martha Fulton both passed away in November 1937, 18 days apart. Their son Thomas died earlier that same year, in January. Anna Bebermeyer passed in 1962. Sadly Harry and Lizzie died too soon in 1968, the result of a car accident.

Their children were Curtis
Dale and Norma Jean. She
married Hercules Renda and they
had two children. Curtis married
Helen Lampert in 1943 and to
this union, two children were
born, Dennis Ray and Jeanna
Marie.

Curtis served in the US Naval Air Corp, farmed and delivered mail before becoming a minister. Helen was a schoolteacher in various one room schools and at Talmage. Dennis married Janette Garten, and Jeanna married Dale Short.

Curtis died in 2012. and Helen lives in Salina and will be 99 years old in August.
